**CONFLICTED (Presented by our Lecturer at our April Meeting)** 

I feel conflicted during Lent and Christmas. Christmas is truly a joyous time indeed, but I have sometimes wondered if I really should be so happy. After all, the reason Jesus was born into this world was to suffer and die for me, because of my sins. It is truly joyous for us that God is willing to have His beloved Son go through such suffering for us, His creations. Conversely I and all of human-kind brought on Christ's suffering because of our actions through selfishness. I wish Christ did not have to suffer, and especially that I was not part of the cause for that pain. Thankfully God is Love, and He does not limit the love He gives His creation. Even to the point that He allows His most Beloved Son to suffer and die for us. this consternation remains with me throughout Lent and is especially strong on Good Friday. Holy Saturday always brings me peace for it reminds me that God's suffering is over. Not only is it over but through His suffering He conquered death and He gives us salvation. What a beautiful and humbling gift that is for us, His children. We have hope and that hope comes from our salvation.

I was at my Uncle's funeral yesterday (April 7). His oldest son, my cousin, is a priest and he was concelebrating with the Arch Bishop of Cincinnati. My uncle was a good man and welcomed Christ into his life. He was a farmer so he relied heavily on the Creator's nature for his living. It seemed to me that he understood that his living is as much in God's hands as it is up to his toil to be successful. Perhaps because a farmer's success is so intertwined with the whims of the nature that God created that many rural communities have a rich faith. Let us not forget that every profession and skill is reliant on God's grace. My cousin's homily could have easily been one of tears but instead his message was one of hope and even joy. We are right to grieve for the loss of one we love. But because of our faith what we grieve is that person's absence from the earth and our faith brings us the knowledge and hope that our loved ones precede us to a greater life, to a fulfillment of the salvation that God gave us through His Son. If we do our part we will be reunited with our loved ones again.

Yesterday (the Second Sunday of Easter) was Divine Mercy Sunday. I can not think of a more beautiful way that God could help me resolve the conflict I feel at Christmas and Easter. It is still sad that my sins caused the Son of Man pain, but Christ willingly took on that suffering because of Love for me. Divine Mercy Sunday reminds me that going forward we should not allow that suffering to go to waste. The Divine Mercy Chaplet may be the most beautiful prayer in my mind. The essence of the Divine Mercy chaplet tells us that the benefit of God's love was not a once and done event 2000 years ago. God conquered death and sin for all time through the first Easter. We are to not allow that suffering to be in vain, we are to let God's mercy continue to bless us for our immortal lifetimes. The chaplet asks for mercy on us in this world, the mercy that was shown us through Christ's passion. Additionally, the words of the prayer echoe the sacrifice of the Mass and underscores our part in Mass. We are the Body of the Church. We are not to be just onlookers at Mass, we are to embrace the salvation given to us and offer back to God Christ's passion, the passion that made our salvation possible. *Pat Rosmarin. Lecturer*

## Feasts/Titles of Our Lady

Mary is the Mother of God. When we call Mary by this title, we realize what it means about Jesus. Jesus was both truly God and truly man, meaning he had to have had a mother. Mary, a woman without sin, is a perfect example of how to live a God-centered life. She was set apart from the beginning to be someone special. She has been given many titles and many feast days, which is a sign to us of how important she is.

From the moment of her conception, it was clear that Mary was destined to do great things in the eyes of God. She was conceived without Original Sin and never sinned once during her life. Mary is an example of how to always say 'yes' to what God asks of us. When the angel Gabriel asked if she would take on the great responsibility of being the mother of God, she did not think of the struggles and challenges, but rather she sought to please God. She said yes with great joy. God needed a holy mother for his holy son, so from the moment of conception he set Mary apart from all other women. There never was and never will be a more perfect, holy woman. The birth of Jesus confirms to Catholics that God was both divine and human. Mary brought to reality his 'human side'. She watched him grow older, learn new things, and draw closer to his father in heaven. She was the perfect mother to the perfect son. Even when her son hung on a cross, Mary knew that this was God's will. Her whole life was dedicated to pleasing God and doing what was asked of her. She never turned away from any challenge that was thrown her way. She is not only an example of holiness to everyone she encountered, she is an example to us on how to say yes to God's call.

One of Mary's very important and widely celebrated feast days is the feast of Mary's Assumption into Heaven. This feast is celebrated on August 15<sup>th</sup>. In many Catholic countries it is considered a holy day of obligation. On this day we celebrate the occasion when Mary rose, body and soul, into heaven. The belief that Mary did not die but was instead taken into heaven had been widespread for centuries, but it wasn't until 1950 that Pope Pius XII declared it a dogma of the Catholic faith. Since Mary, being the Mother of God and conceived without sin, was a very holy and special woman, God needed a special way to symbolize that her earthly journey was over and it was time for her to begin her time in

heaven. Throughout the world, colorful parades and processions are held to commemorate this feast day. Many involve beautifully decorated statues of our Blessed Mother. One of the biggest celebrations of the Assumption is held in our very own state of Ohio, in Cleveland's "Little Italy" neighborhood. It is a four day event featuring nightly mass, processions dedicated to Our Lady, Italian food, carnival-style games, and firework shows. This is one of the most popular and celebrated of Mary's feast days, and it is an important day for the Catholic Church.

In the Gospels, we read "And the name of the Virgin was Mary." (Luke 1:27) "This most holy, sweet, and worthy name was eminently fitting to so holy, sweet, and worthy a virgin." (The Little Book of Mary) Mary has many other titles, including Queen of the Rosary. The origins of the rosary are "sketchy", but many people credit St. Dominic for tirelessly promoting the use of the rosary after a vision from Mary. Through St. Dominic and St. Alan de la Roche, Mary made 15 promises (known as the 15 Rosary Promises). They include promises of special graces, protection against sin, more virtue, and deliverance from purgatory for those who are devoted to the rosary. Mary also promised the fulfillment of our intentions if we ask for her intercession through the rosary. Because of these reasons, Mary is called Queen of the Rosary.

From the instant of Mary's conception, it was obvious that she was put on this Earth to do great things. Born without original sin, she is our pure, perfect, holy mother. She shows us how to live our lives and say yes to whatever is asked of us. Mary is a source of inspiration for many. Through the rosary we can draw closer to her and we can be confident that, through her intercession, whatever we ask will be granted. Mary is the flawless Mother of God, and we know that she will always be there for us.

As most of you know, the 4 principles of the Knights of Columbus are *Charity, Unity, Fraternity*, and *Patriotism*. The four degree ceremonies are each based on one of these principles. The 1st degree, based on *charity*, is the one you have taken. The 2nd and 3rd degrees being offered on the above date at the Bryce Eck Parish Center of St.

Andrew Church, 3880 Reed Road, Upper Arlington are based on *unity* and *fraternity*. One does not achieve full knighthood in the Knights of Columbus until you have taken the 3rd degree. The 4th degree is optional.

To give you some idea of the extent of your time commitment on May 19, all 2nd and 3rd degree candidates are expected to meet at the Key Bank across from St. Michael's at 10:45 AM from which you will be transported to St. Andrew's Bryce Eck Center, 3880 Reed Road, Upper Arlington, by your brother knights of St. Michael Council.
