#### KOFC INSURANCE: TWO IMPORTANT ADDITIONS TO A DISABILITY INSURANCE POLICY

If you make the commitment to protect your future income by buying disability insurance, look closely at any available extra coverage ("riders"). Some can add considerable long-term advantages at a moderate cost.

Two of the riders available with a **Knights of Columbus Income Armor Policy** are a Cost of Living Adjustment (**COLA**) and a Guaranteed Purchase Option (**GPO**).

**COLA:** Each year, the benefits your policy provides for disabilities that last more than one year will increase to help compensate for inflation. Medical costs continue to increase significantly each year, and that trend isn't likely to change anytime soon.



**GPO:** At some point after buying your Income Armor policy, you may see a need to increase the base monthly benefit for which you're eligible. Without this rider, the increase would be subject to a medical exam. If you've developed a health condition that makes you medically ineligible, you wouldn't have that option. With the rider, you don't need to provide evidence of medical insurability.

Other Income Armor riders may be available in your state that would enhance your coverage. If you don't have disability insurance or you have it through work but don't know how much protection it actually provides — let have a discussion to see if Income Armor makes sense for you.

#### **AUTHENTIC LIVING (Presented by our Lecturer at our September Meeting)**

This month I want to share a few random ramblings, food for thought.

<u>Authentic Faith</u>: Fr. Pendolphi gave a homily a couple weeks ago about "Authentic Faith". The jist was there is a difference in practicing your faith for the good of God, vs. practicing your faith for the good of yourself. I thought about that a bit and asked myself how genuinely, how authentically I exercise my faith. I think I measure up okay but I still need some work in this regard. One good way to ensure that a good deed is genuine rather than ostentatious is to not let anyone know you did the deed. Offering up a prayer for someone without telling them is an example. However, there are times that you know a person will receive greater comfort and support if they know you are praying for them. Sharing the fact that you pray for another is also a good way to only God and myself truly know how authentic my faith is. I am best armed by remembering always that a good act can turn into something more self-serving than serving to others. If I keep that in mind I can guard against selfishness.

<u>Reconciliation – God's Authentic Love</u>: Sometimes it takes me a while for things to sink into this noggin of mine. I have written in the past about confession and how much we gain from it. By the nature of the act of Reconciliation we focus heavily on ourselves, and that is good and necessary. We gain so much from reconciliation. Burdens are lightened, the weight of stain is lifted from our shoulders, we are renewed. That God has given this sacrament to us is a beautiful measure of His love for us. God surely didn't have to give this

to us, nor would anyone disagree that in human terms, at least, we so often don't deserve such open and inviting mercy. God is a God of pure love and through that pure love He continually keeps His arms open to us and invites us to share through Him that love. What I finally realized is while we are busy focusing on ourselves when preparing for Reconciliation, what a beautiful expression of giving glory to God it is when we step into that confessional. By stepping into the confessional we express God's glorious nature not only because we show belief in God's mercy but also we are recognizing that God has the power to forgive our sins.

Authentic living, an example: Just recently my door bell rang. When I answered it there was a girl probably about 11 or 12 and her Dad. It only took a second to see the young girl was upset. Her Dad asked if the car on the street was ours and then told us he and his daughter were riding bikes and she accidentally hit the side of the car. With that the girl started to cry and said "I'm sorry", with obvious sincerity. Since it is my daughter's car I went into the house to get her before taking a look at the damage. When we got out there we indeed could see some minor damage, basically an 18 inch scratch in the paint. The girl began to cry again and said she was sorry. Without a hitch, Brenda gave the girl a hug and said it was no big deal. She told her it was an old car and that she understood it was an accident. Brenda also added that she was grateful the girl and her Dad told us about it instead of continuing on, that it was the right thing to do. Brenda could have justifiably been upset, but instead by her actions she consoled the girl, reinforced that it is best to admit to a wrong even if accidental, and reaffirmed that we have the capacity to show compassion even when we have been wronged. Both the girl and her Dad were quite relieved, and I was proud of Brenda. Her actions were a message of compassion to someone who most likely did not expect it.

Chairman for this event is brother knight Bill Neumeier who solicits everyone's help (see separate article below) to make this dinner as successful as it has been in the past.

Our KofC Council #11445 has sponsored the annual Spaghetti Dinner for 12 years now since picking up the responsibility for this event from the Athletic Association in the year 2000. It is a great parish social event, as well as, a good fund-raiser. Meals served (from dine-in and drive-thru) average around 750-800 annually.

Funds raised are targeted to support religious vocations, and traditionally have been used to provide direct support to selected seminarians, such as recently ordained **Fr. Ty Tomson** and transitional **Deacon Nick** Droll from our parish. Over the past 12 years, we've raised approximately \$30,000, which has been matched by about \$6,000 from the national KofC RSVP program that contributes \$100 for every \$500 we provide to support seminarians and religious novitiates.

If your name is listed above, Sunday, October 28 is the next opportunity to take the <u>2nd and 3rd</u> <u>degrees</u> in the Knights of Columbus so you can achieve full knighthood in the order. As most of you know, the 4 principles of the Knights of Columbus are *Charity, Unity, Fraternity,* and *Patriotism*. The four degree ceremonies are each based on one of these principles. The 1st degree, based on *charity*, is the one you have taken. The 2nd and 3rd degrees being offered on the above date at the **Bryce Eck Parish Center of St. Andrew Church, 3880 Reed Road, Upper Arlington** are based on *unity* and *fraternity*. One does not achieve full knighthood in the Knights of Columbus until you have taken the 3rd degree. The 4th degree is optional.

To give you some idea of the extent of your time commitment on October 28, all 2nd and 3rd degree candidates are expected to meet at the Key Bank across from St. Michael's at 11:00 AM from which you will be transported to St. Andrew's Bryce Eck Center, 3880 Reed Road, Upper Arlington, by your brother knights of St. Michael Council. Candidates must be at the Bryce Eck Center by 11:30 AM for some administrative details. (Bring your current 1<sup>st</sup> degree membership card with you.) The degree ceremonies begin at 12:00 noon. Each ceremony lasts about 1 hour and 15 minutes with about a half hour break in between. All activities should be over by about 4:00 PM.
